PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

SERMON "Throwing Stones...or Being One" by Pastor Bill Vincent

They were angry. They had had enough: had enough with all the speaking and preaching, the accusations and 'truth'...or whatever. They had heard enough.

They were angry, defensive. Time to shut up this blowhard, teach him a lesson. So they struck back. They picked up stones and struck back.

I don't know about you, but, unfortunately, I can identify with them. Feeling accused, blamed. And my defenses go up, and I want to strike back.

And we start to throw stones, using deception and insult to slander and harass mercilessly.

Tell a person long enough and loud enough and consistently enough, and they will come to believe that they are worthless.

And we throw stones with our words.

Ever overhear someone say something cutting, biting, not pleasant (and not true) about you?

Then you will know the bruises of the stones of death.

We throw stones with our deeds.

I was coming home on the interstate once. I had just passed a vehicle. Then they sped up and pulled alongside me. The passenger 'flipped me the bird', then he and the driver laughed and went on.

Or ever have someone completely ignore you, as if you are not there, don't exist, don't matter?

Then you know the weight of the stones of death.

We throw stones with our life-style.

Like the one who completely disregards the needs and plight of others, cares not a whit about the ramifications of their actions and choices and lifestyle on others, its effect on others.

With disdain for the welfare and well-being of others, we throw trash out our car window, not caring about how it might affect others.

And a woman seeks to better herself and affirm her self worth, and a man rapes his own wife to "put her in her place."

We know of stones of lead propelled by gun powder and stones of shrapnel propelled by the explosive force of bombs.

There are literal deaths from all sorts, shapes, and sizes of stones. And the bodies lie scattered around us.

And there are all sorts of other, figurative deaths, often just as painful and destructive. And stones of death fly

-with every word spoken with venom and every deed guided by vengeance that tears at the fragile fabric of the human soul;

-with every choice we make that degrades someone or belittles another, that calls into question the God-given worth of a fellow human being.

We throw these stones ourselves. And we have them thrown at us.

And they leave us numb, unfeeling. They bruise our capacity for community, for compassion. They bludgeon our ability to care and trust, to love. They dole out death to our heart and soul.

Ironic that, in our story from Acts, it is precisely Stephen's message about the good news of Jesus Christ and God's love that convicts the people of their throwing stones, and that elicits their rage.

Yet such is not always the case. Sometimes our response comes from jealousy, or fear, or selfishness.

Yet whatever the reason, this is not what God desires.

What God desires is for us not to throw stones, but to become stones...of life: living stones.

Now, I don't know about you, but I can identify with throwing stones.

But I'm not sure I know how to become a living stone...though perhaps I may recognize it when I see it.

Like when a group knits blankets for the Neo-natal Intensive Care Unit so that these premies, struggling to grow and survive, can sense, in their own way, that someone cares for them.

Or when someone stands up to a bully on someone else's behalf: putting themselves in the path of stones of death in order to embody their care and concern.

Or when someone notices a student struggling with school, be it math or reading, and offers to provide tutoring so the student can learn and grow, and feel better about themselves. (And know they are not alone).

Or like neighbors helping neighbors, near or far: lending a helping hand in the midst of yet another tornado's destructive wake or flood waters washing away someone's whole life.

I remember hearing a story of a woman who was in a concentration camp during World War II. She was pregnant at the time. One of her guards was a kindly soul, and, knowing her need for good nutrition, smuggled an orange into her cell. It was meant for her, and for the health of her unborn child. Yet she took that orange and, section by section, parceled it out among her cellmates.

Even as the air around her was thick with the stones of death – with the deprivation and dehumanization of a concentration camp – she (and this kindly guard) became a living stone for life.

Nowadays, life for us may not be as oppressive as a concentration camp, but the air around us is still thick with stones of death.

And in the midst of a culture and society cluttered with stones of death, we are to be transformed into living stones – not only personally but as a community – to build up each other, and others: in the understanding of God's love, in commitment to God's way, in heeding Christ's call. Building one another up as the people God intends us to be: building blocks of the kingdom of God, signposts of the reign and presence of God.

Stones that not only know life themselves, but share it, too, so that those who come in contact with these stones are not bruised and battered but healed and made whole.

How do we become living stones? What's the process?

I remember being taught about the three different kinds of rock.

First there is igneous rock: formed from out of a volcano from the cooled magma, from the hot lava.

Now heat may indeed have something to do with this process.

But I don't think God wants us to blow our tops, like some volcanoes.

Then there is sedimentary rock. Note: I did not say 'sedentary', lying around like spiritual couch potatoes. But sedimentary, as in 'layers'.

That may be on target. Layers of personality. Layers of growth: it's a process, becoming this living stone.

Perhaps metamorphic rock, though, is the best image.

Taking another type of rock and, through applying a lot of heat and pressure, creating a new rock: a metamorphosis, a transformation.

Metamorphic rock.

Heat and pressure. An apt description of life, of this process. The woman in the concentration camp could certainly identify. So would the community addressed by Peter's letter. And Stephen, for that matter. A situation of persecution and stress: ridicule, harassment, slander; a hostile environment; going against the prevailing norms and manner of society.

Yet through this process, being pressed, shaped, polished into living stones to proclaim the grace and goodness of God.

And, of course, one of the greatest and most notable examples of this transformation from throwing stones to becoming one is Saul himself, whom we tend to know as 'Paul'. His own experience: being imprisoned, beaten, stoned, run out of town. Yet all the while sharing the good news – and life – of God's love.

Sounds scary, this metamorphosis through heat and pressure. Yet we need to remember the grace of God.

God is present, through Christ and even the cross

For we who once were nobodies, are now God's people.

We who once, in throwing stones ourselves, showed no mercy, now are people of mercy, for we know God's mercy.

Perhaps it will be helpful, too, to remember this image:

That through the heat and pressure of life – from whatever source – if we are faithful and persist, the dark, black, dull lump of coal is transformed into a bright, clear, brilliant diamond, that dances with light, that is alive with the fire within, that shines, reflecting the glory and goodness of God.

May God produce a diamond – a living stone – out of me, and out of you.
