## **SCRIPTURE READING** Genesis 18:1-15

GENESIS 18:1-15 (New Revised Standard Version)

<sup>1</sup> The LORD appeared to Abraham by the oaks of Mamre, as he sat at the entrance of his tent in the heat of the day. <sup>2</sup> He looked up and saw three men standing near him. When he saw them, he ran from the tent entrance to meet them, and bowed down to the ground. <sup>3</sup> He said, "My lord, if I find favor with you, do not pass by your servant. <sup>4</sup> Let a little water be brought, and wash your feet, and rest yourselves under the tree. <sup>5</sup> Let me bring a little bread, that you may refresh yourselves, and after that you may pass on -- since you have come to your servant." So they said, "Do as you have said." <sup>6</sup> And Abraham hastened into the tent to Sarah, and said, "Make ready quickly three measures

of choice flour, knead it, and make cakes." <sup>7</sup> Abraham ran to the herd, and took a calf, tender and good, and gave it to the servant, who hastened to prepare it. <sup>8</sup> Then he took curds and milk and the calf that he had prepared, and set it before them; and he stood by them under the tree while they ate.

<sup>9</sup> They said to him, "Where is your wife Sarah?" And he said, "There, in the tent." <sup>10</sup> Then one said, "I will surely return to you in due season, and your wife Sarah shall have a son." And Sarah was listening at the tent entrance behind him. <sup>11</sup> Now Abraham and Sarah were old, advanced in age; it had ceased to be with Sarah after the manner of women. <sup>12</sup> So Sarah laughed to herself, saying, "After I have grown old, and my husband is old, shall I have pleasure?" <sup>13</sup> The LORD said to Abraham, "Why did Sarah laugh, and say, 'Shall I indeed bear a child, now that I am old?' <sup>14</sup> Is anything too wonderful for the LORD? At the set time I will return to you, in due season, and Sarah shall have a son." <sup>15</sup> But Sarah denied, saying, "I did not laugh"; for she was afraid. He said, "Oh yes, you did laugh."

## PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

**SERMON** "Living on Nothing More Than a Word" by Pastor Bill Vincent

Promises, promises.

We've heard them before: words spoken so easily.

"I'll get right back to you."

"The check's in the mail."

"I'm there for you."

The experience in human relationships of promises, some of which are fulfilled, some of which are not.

So you'll pardon us, God, if we have our doubts. We're a wee bit wary when we hear "the check's in the mail," or even "Sarah shall have a son."

Now we know how this story ends, how this promise is fulfilled.

But all too often where we live is at the end of this passage, where we don't have the end of the story; all we have is a word.

Give us something concrete.

Living on nothing but a promise; having to rely on nothing but someone's word; hearing the word but not having.

Our experience of promises with others, which means our experience of disappointment and betrayal. Having nothing in hand but a word.

Whereas we'd rather live by

"A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush."

"Show me the money."

"Prove it."

Note: There is an interconnectedness – an intimate relationship – between the word spoken and the one who speaks it.

So maybe the issue is not so much the promise itself as who makes it; not so much the word itself as the speaker.

Is the speaker trustworthy?

Is the promise maker faithful?

In other words, whose word is it?

Again, we are wary.

For, from our experience, we know you can trust some, but not others.

And even then...

Cara and Robert had just announced their engagement. We were ecstatic. They were so good together. This was great! We were so excited, my roommate and I threw open the windows to our dorm room and announced it to the whole campus.

The next day, I began to hear rumors that the engagement was a joke.

I couldn't believe it. "That's not true. I know these people. They wouldn't do that." Only they did.

And I was crushed, devastated.

Yes, I got over it. But such an experience leaves a mark.

Can we trust those who speak a promise (explicitly or implicitly) to us?

Maybe there have been times when someone has spoken a promise to us and fallen down on the job. And we have become disillusioned and cynical.

Of course, part of the reason we are uncomfortable with this passage is because of the mirror it holds up to us, and the question it asks:

Will we be trustworthy in the promises we make?

Are we ourselves trustworthy when we speak a promise?

"Everything will be fine."

"Everything will turn out all right."

"Things are going to work out just fine."

Do we know whereof we speak? Are we speaking a promise we can fulfill?

Maybe we need to be careful with the promises we make, making promises that are within the realm of our control, our ability.

For everything may not turn out fine: we don't know; we don't have control over everything that may happen. We cannot protect our loved one from every eventuality.

But maybe we can deliver on the promise of helping them as best we can, standing with them in their struggle, being there when they need us.

And be committed to the promises we make on which we can deliver.

This is the stumbling block for Sarah (and Abraham). I.e., can God deliver? Sarah laughed when confronted with that question.

Was Abraham laughing inside? too polite to laugh in his guest's face.

But note – with this God – the laughter gives birth to Isaac, whose very name means 'laughter'.

And how many times have we laughed at God's promises, at God's future?

"A new heaven and a new earth"? Yeh, right.

"Lose your life to save it"? Oh, that makes *perfect* sense.

One wise person – by name of Jesus – once said,

"You will know them by their fruits." (Matthew 7:16)

And as it turns out, God more than measures up to God's own standard.

For God promised a son to Abraham and Sarah. And guess what?

God promised to deliver the Hebrews from slavery in Egypt. And guess what?

God promised a deliverer "when the fullness of time had come" (Galatians 4:4) And guess what?

God promised a son to Mary. And guess what?

And that very Son promised... Well...

One person noted,

Sarah's laughter arises from the absurd disproportion between the divine promise and the human possibilities. (New Oxford Annotated Bible)

But is it any more absurd than the promise to raise a crucified man from the grave?

Will we trust God, the one who makes such promises to us?

The ultimate foundation of our life is based on the word of promise God has spoken to us. And the God who has spoken to us is faithful.

God has proven God's faithfulness and trustworthiness in the past, so we can rely on God's faithfulness and trustworthiness for the present and the future. And we can live with but a promise, even though we may not see its final fulfillment.

"In the world you will have trouble. But be of good cheer, I have overcome the world" (John 16:33).

"I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).

"Nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:38-39).

"A new heaven and a new earth," with no more tears and no more crying (Revelation 21:1.4).

God promises to be with us, to guide us, to strengthen us, to redeem us.

Of course, we still we have our doubts.

For there are times when God doesn't seem to be around, or our prayers are not answered.

And so still, we experience 'disappointment'.

But maybe these experiences do not so much call into question God's faithfulness, as our understanding.

Walter Brueggemann notes that this passage

leaves itself open to misunderstanding, as though faith makes every desirable thing possible. But not everything is promised. What is "possible" is characterized only as everything promised by God. That is, only what corresponds to God's good purposes is possible. [God] has promised a future in a new community, but not everything we would seek. (*Genesis*, Interpretation series, p.161)

God never promised us a rose garden, but God did promise to be with us. God never promised everything we wanted, but God did promise to watch over us, like the lilies of the field and the birds of the air (see Matthew 6:25-33).

God promises to be with us, to guide us, to watch over us, to welcome and receive us...always.

And in light of our experience with oh-so-many other promises, that's a promise I'll take.

John Newton, in his incomparable hymn, reminds us,

the Lord has promised good to me[us]

("Amazing Grace, How Sweet the Sound" 1772)

When it comes to the Lord, that's a promise we can bank on.

\*HYMN "How Firm a Foundation" GtG 463

- 1. How firm a foundation, ye saints of the Lord, is laid for your faith in God's excellent Word! What more can be said than to you God hath said, to you who for refuge to Jesus have fled?
- 2. "Fear not, I am with thee, O be not dismayed, for I am thy God, and will still give thee aid; I'll strengthen thee, help thee, and cause thee to stand, upheld by my righteous, omnipotent hand.
- 3. "When through the deep waters I call thee to go, the rivers of sorrow shall not overflow; for I will be near thee, thy troubles to bless, and sanctify to thee thy deepest distress.

- 4. "When through fiery trials thy pathway shall lie, my grace, all sufficient, shall be thy supply; the flame shall not hurt thee; I only design thy dross to consume, and thy gold to refine.
- 5. "The soul that on Jesus hath leaned for repose, I will not, I will not desert to its foes; that soul, though all hell should endeavor to shake, I'll never, no, never, no, never forsake."
