THE WORD

LIGHTING OF THE ADVENT WREATH: The Candle of Joy

One: The first candle reminds us of the hope fulfilled in Christ's birth and the hope we have in him. The second candle reminds us of the peace that Christ brings to the world and shares with us by his presence. The candle that we light today reminds us of the great joy surrounding the birth of Jesus.

All: Angels sang of "good news of a great joy for all the people." The shepherds went to Bethlehem to "see this thing which the Lord had made known to them, ... and returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen." (Luke 2:10,15,20)

One: For behold, a child is born. Behold, the King has come. And his coming means joy for all the world.

Let us pray.

Unison: Blessed Lord, we rejoice in your coming in mercy and peace. You cared enough to come and live among us. You taught us the meaning of love. You showed us the way of life. You share with us joy in communion with you. Thank you, Savior Christ. May our lives be songs of praise as we sing of our joy to the world. Amen.

SCRIPTURE READINGS Isaiah 61:1-4,8-11 John 1:6-8,19-28 I Thessalonians 5:16-24

ISAIAH 61:1-4,8-11 (New Revised Standard Version+)

The spirit of the Lord God is upon me,

because the Lord has anointed me;

the Lord God has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed,

to bind up the brokenhearted,

to proclaim release to the captives,

and liberation to the prisoners;

to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor, and a day of vindication for our God;

to comfort all who mourn; to provide for those who mourn in Zion – to give them a crown in place of ashes,
the oil of joy in place of mourning,
the mantle of praise in place of discouragement.
They will be called oaks of righteousness,
the planting of the Lord, to display the glory of the Lord.

they shall repair the ruined cities,
the devastations of many generations.

For I the Lord love justice,
I hate robbery and wrongdoing;

PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

SERMON "Aligning with Joy" by Pastor Bill Vincent

There is joy in life.

Joy in knowing and doing the will of God: working together with God's intent, being a part of God's will, being in tune with God's purposes and plan and life, for us and for the world.

Like the servant mentioned in Isaiah 61, who is called and sent to bring good news to the people; and the people, who will rebuild what is devastated and love justice – just like the Lord.

Like John the Baptist, who is clear about his calling – about who he is and who he is not – who is clear about his part in God's plan: that it is not to draw attention to himself but to the Light that all need to see.

Like the Thessalonians – and us – who "rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances" and "hold fast to what is good" and "abstain from every form of evil."

Not that life like this is without its difficulties, which may seem to preclude that joy. For we can, and do, turn from God's way and try to go our own way; which may work for a while, but not really, not for long.

But then there is joy in confession. Yes, you heard me correctly: there is joy in confession. Joy in "getting it off my chest": the burden of sin. Relief in being over the deceit and secrecy, the hiding. Release by being out in the open: in the Light.

And, of course, joy in forgiveness and restoration of the broken relationship. Like the joy of the father in the return of the prodigal – and aren't we all prodigals at one time or another...or many times?

And, again, not that this life – not that there isn't pain.

For we can experience resistance to this way of life – not only out there, from others, but also in here, within ourselves. The struggle between doing God's thing and doing our own, between going our way and choosing God's.

A struggle that can be severe, and very difficult to discern the way through that struggle.

But then, that is part of what Paul means when he writes to the Thessalonians, "Test everything." Test out the words of the prophets and the 'spirits' that call to you and seek to draw you in one direction or another. For there are plenty of voices clamoring for you to "Do this!" or "Do that!", to follow this path or choose this direction. Test them, in order better to discern which voices and which words and which prophecies are calling you in the right direction: i.e., are actually God's voice and God's word and God's directing.

By what standard do we "test" these voices, these claims? We hear something of that standard when we hear the charge to "bind up the brokenhearted," to "comfort all who mourn," and to be about the work of righteousness and mercy. We hear it in the words "to do justice, and love kindness, and walk humbly with our God" (Micah 6:8). We see it in the life of Jesus Christ: in his reaching out to those on the margins; in his exercising his power for the welfare of the lowly and outcast; in his words of compassion and his deeds of grace. And in his reminder, "by their fruits you will know them" (see Matthew 7:15-20).

You may remember a TV show from a number of years back: "The A-Team." A group of military vets were on the lamb, running from the law for a crime they didn't commit. Along the way, they offered their services to others, to help right wrongs and find justice for others in need. In the midst of the work, sometime during each episode, their leader, 'Hannibal' Smith, would say, "I love it when a plan comes together."

"I love it when a plan comes together."

There is indeed a joy, a satisfaction, a sense of purpose fulfilled, when a plan – God's plan – comes together in my life, in the life of those around me, in the life of the world. When I know – when I can sense – that God's intention is working itself out in my life, and I am aware of that and in tune with that and working together with that. For maybe I too have been anointed by the Spirit of God and sent to share good news and to be good news.

For then I know I am doing what I need to be doing, and I am fulfilling what I need to fulfill – indeed, maybe even what I was created to fulfill.

Like the first Christmas story.

Remember: lives were changed and re-directed. Choices were made, and difficult ones at that.

And an infant was not what was expected – certainly not what most people were looking for when they sought to discern God's plan and purpose.

But those who could, and did, discern something of that plan – they knew joy. The joy of angels singing. The joy of God's plan coming together, and their being a part of it.

Oh yes, most of them needed help in discerning that this was God's plan. Help from an angel or two; or some strangers from far away; or even a lowly, unnoticed person right under their noses.

So, maybe we can help each other to discern and "test everything."

Though please, please: let it not be in a glib "It's God's will" sort of way.

For cancer is not God's will.

War is not God's will.

Using another person for one's own sick pleasure or power grab is not God's will.

But trusting God to be with you during the cancer treatments – that is God's will.

And working to bring a just peace, even in our own neighborhood – that is God's will.

And teaching and exemplifying respect for others and affirming each person's worth as a child of God created in the image of God – that is God's will.

Funny thing about writing sermons: all too often, somewhere in the midst of the reading and writing and reflection and prayer – somewhere in the process, I come to find I'm speaking as much to myself as to anyone else.

I was grumpy, feeling all the stress, with the busy-ness and expectations and deadlines and things to do.

Then it hit me: "You know, I really think this is what I'm supposed to be doing. This is God's calling to me." And the release and relief I felt, and the smile that came across my face. Hearing that for myself, affirming that, and acting on that. And recognizing that I am in some small way being aligned with God's will for my life.

There is joy in life, even in the difficult circumstances, even in the painful situations. Joy in aligning ourselves with God's will.

Joy in the affirmation

-this is where we stand

-this is what we do

-this is how we live.

Because this – living in God's will – this is where God is.
