PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

SERMON "Addendum...with a Twist" by Pastor Bill Vincent

Yes, you are to be forgiven for thinking you are experiencing *deja vu*.

Yes, much of the worship materials for today are exactly the same as for last week: the Prayer of Confession, the Assurance of Pardon, the scripture passage.

"Is Bill getting lazy?"

No. The repetition is very intentional.

It is an attempt to strike a balance.

Not to suggest that what was said last week was wrong, or skewed, or needed to be corrected.

Everything I said last week about caring for creation, I believe it to be very true, and biblical.

But maybe something was left out. Or overlooked. Or not highlighted.

So, today's message serves as an addendum.

Though not an addendum as simply an afterthought. Although I do confess it did actually come to me as an afterthought. But it's not intended to be an afterthought.

In fact, on further thought, it may be less addendum and more core. Central. Foundational. Or, at the very least, it may need to be the starting point.

Central to what we said last week was the affirmation of celebrating and cherishing God's gift to us of the creation.

This week's addendum – and a crucial one it is – is that we have to remember, and we have to claim, and then we have to live out the truth that part of that gift of creation that we are called to cherish and nurture is...you, me, us.

When we talk about celebrating and caring for creation, we cannot only look outside or beyond ourselves.

We also have to look in the mirror.

And the prime reason to add this note – this addendum – is because there is far too much evidence that we do not care for ourselves...or that we do it in the wrong way.

In our Confession we pray,

Dear God, you have blessed us with the beauty of this world and all the good gifts in it.

All the while we're thinking, "I don't have anything to offer. No gift here!"

we do not take very good care of your gifts.

And that's true: we neglect our own health, we abuse our own bodies.

Help us to appreciate the true beauty of the world, that we might work to share that beauty with others.

But we actually think to ourselves, "Nothing beautiful to share here."

Henri J.M. Nouwen speaks of our world as one

filled with voices that shout: "You are no good, you are ugly; you are worthless, you are despicable, you are nobody – unless you can demonstrate the opposite."

... Over the years, I have come to realize that the greatest trap in our life is not success, popularity or power, but self-rejection. ... we...come to believe in the voices that call us worthless and unlovable, [and when we do, things like] success, popularity and power are easily perceived as attractive solutions. (from Life of the Beloved, 1992)

So we work to achieve success in the eyes of others, because we don't see any achievement in ourself.

We want to be affirmed by others, built up by others, because we're not confident in ourself, we don't see in ourselves anything of value to offer.

Last week, in our Prayer of Dedication,

we recommit[ed] ourselves to caring for all [God has] created in love.

Are we committed to caring for us?

Are you committed to caring for you?

Am I committed to caring for me?

We hear the call, the command, to "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and soul and strength and mind. And love your neighbor as yourself."

But there's that subtle aspect of those commands that we all too often overlook, or it doesn't even register.

How do I love my neighbor as I love myself...when I don't love myself?

If I love my neighbor as I do not love myself, then we're in a world of trouble.

And maybe we already are. When the anger I feel toward myself – I take that anger out on others. When I'm really disappointed in me, and I take it out on you.

We abuse others – emotionally, physically – because we don't care...about them, or about ourselves.

We seek control over something – for it seems we don't have any control over our 'stupid selves' – so we seek to dominate others and oppress whole segments of society.

In our Affirmation of Faith, we note,

God commands us to care for the earth in ways that reflect God's loving care for us.

(Question #19, *The Study Catechism: Full Version*, Copyright ©1998 Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).)

But do we? Especially in regards to us.

Do we acknowledge God's loving care for us?

Will we claim God's loving care for us?

Will we live out – even for ourselves – God's loving care for us?

In other words, will we love ourselves? And that's a fairly basic, fundamental, core question.

Remember what we read in Genesis 2, where God breathes into the human – into us – the life-giving breath: God's own life-giving breath (the Spirit).

Then we go on to talk about caring for creation, the stewardship of creation.

Will we 'steward' God's breath in us?

Will we care for that breath, and nurture it and feed it and sustain it, so that life – so that we – might blossom and bloom and be fruitful?

I picture blowing on embers, or a spark, to get the fire going!

Will we care enough about God's breath in us – will we care enough about ourselves – to make every effort and take every care so that we will flourish as the children of God that we are?

And yes, that includes not just me as a child of God, but you, too...and every other 'you, too' in the world, so that

We...honor God by showing love toward other human beings. (Study Catechism #18)

The poster has a picture of a scruffy looking child making a somewhat defiant statement:

"God don't make no junk!"

They have obviously heard too many voices that said they were junk.

But they're right: "God don't make no junk!"

And that includes you.

So stop treating yourself like you are junk.

You're not.

You are a child of God.

You have the life-breath of God in you.

You are created in the image of God. And though that image has been tarnished – we call that sin – that doesn't mean you are discardable junk.

Broken? Maybe.

Discardable? No!

Now, I'm very aware that what I am trying to say can be heard wrong, and can be twisted toward ends that are contrary to the true intent.

This is not a message about selfish love: loving yourself selfishly to the detriment of others or the rest of the world; self-absorbed, and selfishly absorbed, in your life and your life only, and – pardon the expression – to hell with the rest of the world.

This is about loving yourself...appropriately. Because God loves you. And God cherishes you. And God cares for you. And who are you to disagree with God?

God loves you so much to give God's Son for you.

Will we deny that love? "No, doesn't mean me. I have nothing of worth to offer."

Will we reject that love? "Forget that! I don't care about me...or you!"

Will we abuse that love? "I'm the focus of the world. Mine, mine, mine! Gimme, gimme, gimme! And 'pfft' to everyone else!"

We have a love to affirm.

We have a balance to maintain.

So, No, I will not allow you (or anyone else) to run roughshod over God's gift of life in me. No, I will not allow you to recklessly strip mine the resources of who I am for your own selfish, outlandish desires."

But, Yes, I do have something to offer, and I am worthwhile.

God has decreed it! Loud and clear. In a cross, and in an empty tomb.

So how will I choose to care for God's creation of me – not carelessly or selfishly; not to my own detriment, or to yours – but to the flourishing of me, and you; and to the glory of God's will and God's work, and God's intent for life and good in all of creation?

For this care for me does not seek to diminish my commitment to caring for the rest of creation.

But to balance that commitment.

And possibly to motivate that commitment even further.

For we are connected. And caring for creation is an exercise in caring for self. And caring for self is (in many ways) the starting point for caring for creation, and one another.

God loves you.

Will you love you?

And will you share that love – and share you – with the world?

One: AS CREATURES MADE IN GOD'S IMAGE, WHAT RESPONSIBILITY DO WE HAVE FOR THE EARTH?

All: God commands us to care for the earth in ways that reflect God's loving care for us. We are responsible for ensuring that earth's gifts be used fairly and wisely, that no creature suffers from the abuse of what we are given, and that future generations may continue to enjoy the abundance and goodness of the earth in praise to God.
