PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

SERMON "Anniversary! Anniversary?" by Pastor Bill Vincent

I don't like anniversaries.

That may not be the best opening to a sermon for today.

But I'm hoping that maybe I've earned enough credit with you that you'll stick with me and hear me out. (One can only hope.)

For you see, it's not so much that I don't like anniversaries at all, as it is I don't like a particular kind of anniversary: a church anniversary as a longing, pining for the good ole days; where we see the picture on the wall of all those people in the Sunday School class of 1922, and we say, "We want that again!"

An anniversary as wanting to reclaim and relive a time gone by.

And we bemoan life will never be the same again. And we don't like that: we want it to be the same as it was. But it can't be the same again. So we sit mournfully and look longingly at a past that is gone, a past in which we are stuck.

That's an anniversary as an end.

And that's not much of a celebration. That feels more like a dirge.

Now, before you accuse me of being insensitive, let me say: losing what used to be, and we can't go back...that's painful; we need to grieve that. And I hear that. I've had to do some of that grieving myself.

But that cannot be the end of the Anniversary, for that makes the Anniversary 'The End', and we stop living.

So maybe we need to see the anniversary not as an end, but a building block.

Or another way of saying it: the Anniversary not as, in and of itself, a destination, but a stepping stone.

So we arrive at this day, excited about what has gone before, excited about remembering what has happened, and celebrating what has been accomplished, what has been done and lived in the name of the kingdom of God, in the name of building community and building faith.

And that is good. And good to remember. Yes!

But it is not good to stop there, and only do that, and make that the end all and be all of the celebration.

For what we celebrate and what we remember is not the end, and it is not our destination. For we still have a race to run.

Remember:

run with perseverance the race that is set before us.

There is more to be done. We keep on keeping on.

And that race is set before us by the very one who pioneered the race, and the way: the very one who goes before us, and goes with us, even today.

It is something of a 'tricky' balance, this remembering...and still running the race.

And we see that in the words we read from Isaiah.

The very God who tells us to forget the past – for "I am about to do a new thing" – is the same God who reminds us of what God has done, alluding to that foundational memory of the people, the Exodus, with parting the sea and the chariots and all.

And the very God who lifts up God's saving acts in the past is the same God who says, "I am doing a new thing," with something of a new exodus, if you will.

So we remember and celebrate the good things of the past.

But this celebration is not the end: it is not the destination itself. Though, hopefully, it helps us along the way, along our journey.

And, just to be clear, I'm not, necessarily, saying that the journey is our destination either. Maybe the clearest way of saying it is that a relationship is our destination. And as anyone knows, a relationship is not static, it does not sit still; it continues to move and change and grow...or else it stagnates and dies. And if stagnation and death is what we want for our anniversary, then it's not much of a celebration.

It is too easy to remember what has gone on before and bask in the glow of what was, or even what might have been. That's why so many people do it: because it's easy.

But we must not stop living.

There is still more to do and more to accomplish and more to grow and more to be...especially if we remember that what we are doing and what we are seeking to accomplish and how we are seeking to grow and who we are seeking to be all has to do with the living, dynamic, faithful God, who is still among us, who is not done with us and is not done with this world, and is still living and still working and still loving.

So, "how can I keep from singing?" as the hymn asks ("My Life Flows On/How Can I Keep from Singing?" words by Robert Lowry, 1869). And how can we keep from growing? And how can we keep from doing? And how can we keep from our journey of hope and faith and love with our God?

We may pause, and appropriately so.

We may celebrate how so-and-so accomplished wonderful things to demonstrate God's work and love in our community. We may rejoice that such-and-such was faithful and carried on in difficult times.

But let us not idolize them as a "deer in the headlights" crowd that does nothing but stare at the past and admire things gone by.

Let us remember, Yes! Let us be inspired, Yes! And energized. For if they can do great things, so can we...in our own way and in our own time and in our own situation.

And let us be encouraged as we remember...and go on. For if God was faithful to them – AS God was faithful to them – so God is, will be, has promised (and is good for the promise) to be faithful to us now, and in the days and weeks and months and years and life to come...come what may.

So today's celebration – this anniversary celebration – serves as a stepping stone on our journey of faith and life and love with God.

A celebration of all that is good that has brought us to this time and this place on our journey and our relationship with God: for those people and those incidents and those memories. And for that we give thanks for it all. Amen!?

Today some of the specifics we lift up and remember may have to do, specifically, with the Pacific Presbyterian Church. But this is not to overlook or ignore other people and other memories that are part of our heritage, whether it be my own personal heritage or the heritage of another community of faith.

But this is also a celebration in anticipation – a celebration of all that is good that will come from this day: all that we will do and accomplish and be because we re-commit ourselves to this journey and this relationship, to this growth and this God; and we re-dedicate ourselves to the work and will and service and love that God seeks to do in and through us as we give ourselves to God faithfully and willingly and lovingly.

And so we picture that cloud of witnesses of which we read.

And we look at them and celebrate what they have done, and how God's grace and love and hope has been made manifest in them.

But then I invite you to look again: look again at that cloud of witnesses, and see how they are looking at you.

And picture that cloud of witnesses not as welcoming us home because somehow we're done and finished and we have arrived at the stadium and crossed the finish line. No. That may be for another, different kind of service of worship, but not today's.

Today we picture that cloud of witnesses as cheering us on, encouraging us, pulling for us. Because this 'race' – this journey of life – continues for us. And we will continue, and not give up. And these we remember cheer us on, because they've been this way before, and they know it's hard sometimes, and they know it seems impossible sometimes. But they also know it's exhilarating sometimes, and beautiful sometimes. And they know – for certain – that, by God's grace, they made it...and we can too. By God's grace, they made something beautiful and loving and faithful on their journey. And, by God's grace and God's power and God's presence and God's encouragement and God's love working in and through us, we too can make something beautiful and loving and faithful on our journey, as our journey continues this day and the next and the next and the next; for God's goodness, for God's glory, for God's will and purposes.
